Psalms 16 Introduction

- Some scholars believe that the psalm is referring strictly to David and no one else.
- Some liberal commentators have a problem with David being a prophet of God (Acts 2:30) and cannot accept that David could be speaking of the Messiah to come.
- Others contend that this psalm is speaking completely of the Messiah and has no personal references to David at all.
- Still others believe that this psalm speaks of both David and the Messiah to come.
 - NOTE: The end of this psalm (verses 8-11) specifically describes the resurrection of Christ, and is not applicable to David himself (Acts 2:25-31; 13:35-37).

Psalms 16 Introduction

- What did David know?
 - He knew that his offspring would reign forever (2 Samuel 7:16).
 - He knew about the eternal life, eternal kingship, and eternal priesthood of the Messiah.
 - Psalms 45:6 and Hebrews 1:8
 - Psalms 110:1 and Acts 2:34-35
 - Psalms 110:4 and Hebrews 5:6
 - Psalms 2:1-9 and Acts 4:25-26

Relationship to God (Psalms 16:1-4)

Preservation and refuge

Psalms 16:1, "Preserve me, O God; for in thee do I take refuge."

- God has the power to preserve those who are His.
 Therefore, David begins by expressing his desire for God to keep him safe.
- 2. The Son of God himself said, "I will put my trust in him" (Hebrews 2:13; Psalms 18:2); and therefore His Father did indeed preserve Him in the time of His distress (Hebrews 5:7; 13:20; Philippians 2:9).

Relationship to God (Psalms 16:1-4)

My Lord

Psalms 16:2, "(O my soul), thou hast said unto Jehovah, Thou art my Lord: I have no good beyond thee."

- The first "Lord" (KJV) in verse 2 is the name Jehovah or YHWH in the Hebrew.
 - David said of God, "You are my *adonai*." This Hebrew word means "master."
 - Even the Son of God subjected Himself to the Father as His Lord and Master, in perfect obedience (John 6:38; 15:10; Hebrews 5:8; Philippians 2:8; Matthew 26:39, 42); and we are to do the same (Hebrews 12:9; James 4:10).

Relationship to God (Psalms 16:1-4)

Goodness from God

Psalms 16:2, "(O my soul), thou hast said unto Jehovah, Thou art my Lord: I have no good beyond thee."

Psalms 16:2, "You are my Lord, My goodness is nothing apart from You." NKIV

- God is the source of all goodness (James 1:17; Matthew 19:17).
- NOTE: This verse eliminates in my mind the possibility that these first seven verses are referring to Christ.

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Relationship to God (Psalms 16:1-4)

The Effects of a Relationship With God

Psalms 16:3, "As for the saints that are in the earth, they are the excellent in whom is all my delight."

- First, we see that those who are the holy ones of God are the excellent ones in the earth.
 - What joy there is in having fellowship with those who have a common goal and common love for God. (cf. 2 Peter 1:1)

Relationship to God (Psalms 16:1-4) The Effects of a Relationship With God

Psalms 16:4, "Their sorrows shall be multiplied that give gifts for another (god): their drink-offerings of blood will I not offer, nor take their names upon my lips."

- Second, David also expresses a sorrow for those who run after other gods.
 - The very mention of the name of any other god than the true God was solemnly forbidden by the law of Moses. (Exodus 23:13; cf. Ephesians 5:3)
- These pursuits only perpetuate our sorrows. Psalms 16:4; Isaiah 48:5
- All those who pursue another god will ultimately receive "many sorrows" (Psalms 32:10; cf. 1 Timothy 6:10). "Woe unto the wicked! (it shall be) ill (with him); for what his hands have done shall be done unto him." (Isaiah 3:11).

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
